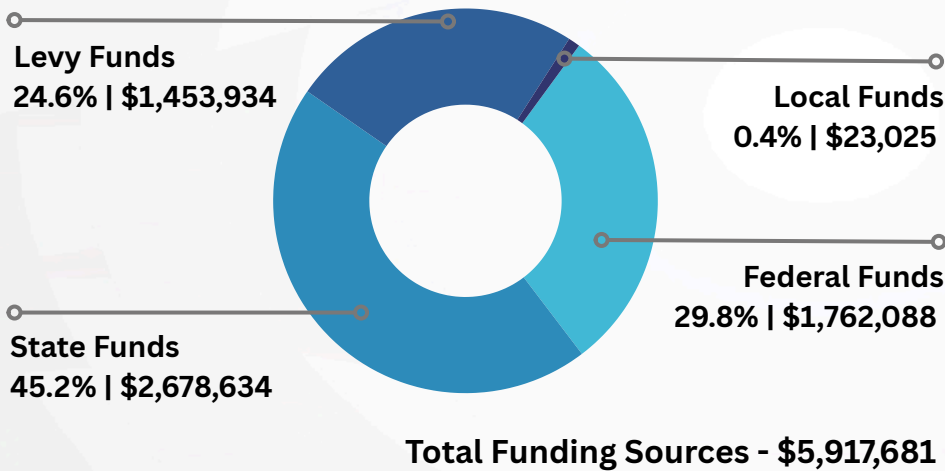

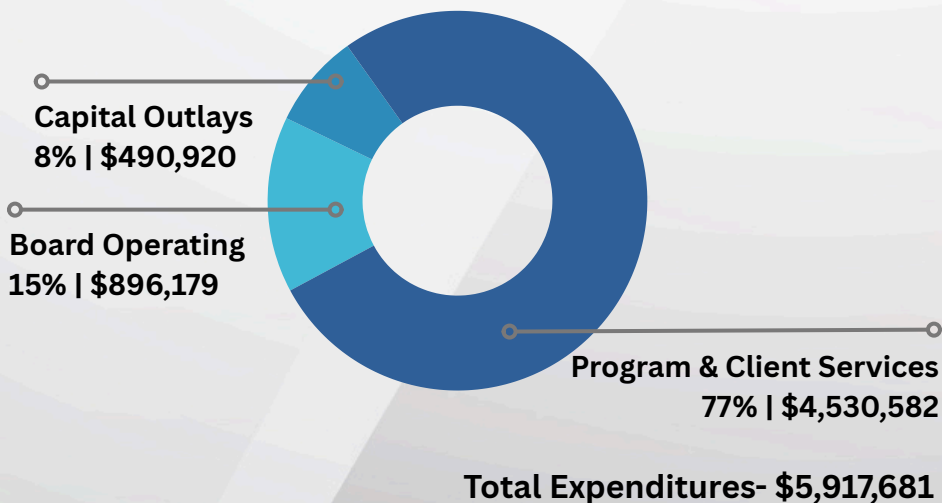
ADAMH FY2025 FINANCIALS

In 2025, the Crawford-Marion ADAMH Board is funded through a mix of state (45.3%), federal (29.8%), levy (24.6%), and local (0.4%) dollars. These funds support essential mental health and substance use disorder services for residents of Crawford and Marion counties. The majority of funding (77%) directly supports Program and Client Services, including treatment, prevention, crisis services, recovery supports, housing, and family supports, while the remaining funds support board operations and capital needs to ensure effective oversight and system sustainability.

Definitions

Levy Funds

Receipts from the collection of taxes.

State Funds

Receipts from State of Ohio, predominantly the Ohio Department of Mental Health and Addiction Services.

Federal Funds

Receipts through Ohio Department of Mental Health and Addiction Services from federal sources and funding directly from federal sources, such as the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration.

Local Funds

Receipts from local Governments, Ohio agencies/non-profits, and Universities.

Board Operating

Salaries, fringe benefits, operating services and materials.

Capital Outlays

Expenditures for long-term assets such as buildings, equipment, and major improvements.

Program & Client Services

Funds used to support direct services, treatment, prevention, and recovery programs for clients.

2025 TIMELINE | JANUARY – JUNE HIGHLIGHTS

Legislative Day

Board leadership met with state legislators to advocate for priorities including crisis services, workforce wellness, and jail-based mental health and addiction programs, reinforcing our commitment to strengthening behavioral health support across our communities.



Culture of Quality (COQ)

The ADAMH Board earned a three-year renewal of the Culture of Quality Certification, recognizing excellence in quality improvement, accountability, and responsible use of public funds.



Assisted Outpatient Treatment Symposium

Associate Director Paula Brown attended a national AOT learning collaborative to strengthen local implementation and improve outcomes for individuals with serious mental illness.



New Office Location

In April, we officially opened our new office at 369 Kensington Place, Marion. This location now serves as our main office, providing a central hub for delivering services and support to the community.



Peer Recovery Supporter Training

From Jun 23–27, our newest class of Peer Recovery Supporters completed their training, gaining the skills to support others on their recovery journeys.



Men's Mental Health Session

On June 24, Dino Tripodis, ambassador for Man Therapy Ohio, shared his personal journey and insights on men's mental health at Ohio State University Marion, highlighting the importance of breaking stigma and encouraging those struggling to "press on."

Problem Gambling and Human Trafficking

Cindy Chizewick, LISW-S, LICDC, LICSW, GAMB, EMDR Certified Psychotherapist, led a session on the intersection of problem gambling and human trafficking, sharing insights on recognizing vulnerabilities.



Marion County Suicide Prevention Walk

More than 60 community members participated in the Marion County Suicide Prevention Walk, raising awareness and honoring loved ones through shared stories of hope and resilience.



Crawford County Suicide Prevention Walk

Approximately 200 residents gathered at Schine's Art Park for the Crawford County Suicide Prevention Walk, featuring personal stories, community activities, and access to prevention resources.



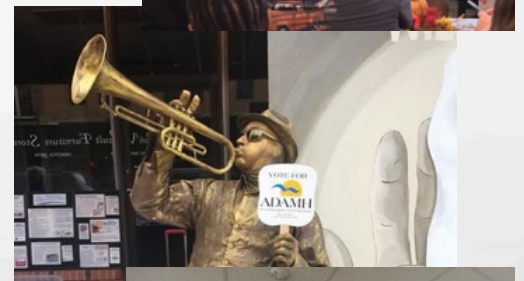
Street Smart Ohio Training

The ADAMH Board hosted Street Smart Ohio at OSU Marion, educating community members on current drug trends, signs of substance use, and prevention strategies, with partners providing Narcan training and exhibits.



Levy Education and Community Outreach

Throughout the levy campaign, the ADAMH Board shared educational videos and community stories to highlight the importance of mental health and addiction services. These efforts emphasized how the services support individuals, families, students, and first responders, while raising awareness about the impact of ADAMH programs in the community.



OhioMHAS Listening Tour

The Board welcomed leadership from the Ohio Department of Mental Health and Addiction Services as part of a listening tour, discussing school-based services, adult crisis supports, and jail-based treatment initiatives.
